This compelling collection of essays explores the Qhapaq nan (or Great Inca Road), an extensive network of trails reaching modern-day Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Chile, and Argentina. These roads and the accompanying agricultural terraces and structures that have survived for more than six centuries are a testament to the advanced engineering and construction skills of the Inca people. The Qhapaq nan also spurred an important process of ecological and community integration across the Andean region. This book, the companion volume to a National Museum of the American Indian exhibition of the same name, features essays on six main themes: the ancestors of the Inca, Cusco as the center of the empire, road engineering, road transportation and integration, the road in the Colonial era, and the road today. Beautifully designed and featuring more than 225 full-color illustrations, The Great Inka Road is a fascinating look at this enduring symbol of the Andean peoples' strength and adaptability.

An intense and deeply personal account of five months spent high in the Andes Mountains, this travelogue combines historical and anthropological details with the thrill of extreme adventure. Hiking at more than 10,000 feet for almost the entire trip, the author follows the great road of the Incas, the Camino Real. Hand-built more than 500 years ago, this road crosses the most difficult and dangerous mountains in all the Americas, and life continues as if Columbus had never sailed. Finding and studying remote villages is central to the quest, and--despite dog attacks, sweltering canyons, floods, and stubborn donkeys--the author makes his way from the equator to Cuzco and on to the most magical city of all: Machu Picchu.

Twenty years before Columbus "discovered America," a lone Spaniard engineer traveled with an early expedition to South America. Shipwrecked, he is rescued by an Indian tribe on the Isthmus of Panama. Assisting in a military raid on a rival tribe, the Spaniard, Ethan and an Indian girl, Attu, join a native whaling voyage into the Pacific Ocean. An ensuing disaster casts them ashore in what today is the country of Peru. But, in 1474, this vast mountain terrain was part of the domain of Capac, the Inca king. Ethan's engineering talents guarantee his safety among the men working on the Inca Road, a two thousand mile long highway along the crests of the Andes Mountains. Ethan and Attu are astounded by the wonders of Cuzco, the capital city of the Inca Empire, but end up barely escaping with their lives. One adventure follows another as the two of them paddle their way down the never-ending, winding tributaries of the upper Amazon toward civilization on the Atlantic coast unknowingly crossing the entire continent of South America.
